NATURE OF THE REVISION

- 1. This first budget revision to the Lesotho Country Programme (CP 200369) aims at:
 - Including a new fortified blended food into the food commodity basket of the nutrition and HIV component (Component 3) in order to align it with WFP nutrition guidelines;
 - Increasing the current budget of the nutrition component in order to respond to the increased number of beneficiaries by 6,350 (from 64,500 to 70,850) under component 3 Nutrition and HIV.
 - Making provision for a specific contribution from the Government of South Africa responding to an appeal made by the Government of Lesotho.
- 2. The proposed budget revision will therefore:
 - Increase the overall food commodity plan by 2,886 mt of food commodities, namely 2,148 mt of Super cereal and by 738 mt of enhanced Supercereal-Plus for a total estimated value of US\$ 2.9 million;
 - Adjust the associated costs through reduction of External Transport budget line by US\$ 0.5 million, increase of Land, Transport, Storage and Handling (LTSH) line by US\$ 1.8 million, reduction of Other Direct Operational Costs (ODOC) budget line by US\$ 2.3 million, reduction of Direct Support Costs (DSC) budget line by US\$ 3.8 million and a reduction of Indirect Support Costs (ISC) budget line by US\$ 0.1 million;
 - Decrease the total costs of the budget plan by US\$ 1.9 million.

JUSTIFICATION FOR BUDGET REVISION

Summary of existing project activities

- 3. WFP is implementing a five-year Country Programme from January 2013 to December 2017. The long-term goals of country programme are to: i) enhance resilience and responsiveness to food-security shocks; and ii) enhance the nutritional and social well-being of vulnerable groups. The objectives of the Country Programme are to:
 - Improve food security through measures that reduce risks associated with disasters (Strategic Objective 2);
 - Support human development and increase pre-primary school enrolment (Strategic Objectives 4 and 5); and
 - Improve socio-economic capacities by investing in people's physical well-being, reducing the care and economic burden associated with chronic illness and improving people's nutritional status (Strategic Objectives 4 and 5).
- 4. The Country Programme has three components:
 - Component 1: Enhancing Resilience and Responsiveness through Disaster Risk Reduction. Through this component, WFP supports livelihood strategies that enhance both incomes and farm-based assets in order to increase farmers' resilience to shocks.
 - **Component 2:** Support for Pre-School Education. Though this component, pre-school children receive a morning porridge and a lunchtime meal to improve their stamina and learning capacity. This is expected to increase school enrolment and ensure that children are better prepared for primary education.

• Component 3: Support for Nutrition and HIV. The Nutrition and HIV component covers three areas; Curative, Preventative and Supportive Interventions aiming at supporting the Ministry of Health in its efforts to improve the quality of nutritional rehabilitation services. This intervention consists in the provision of supplementary feeding for moderately undernourished children, pregnant and lactating women, as well as ART and TB-DOT clients. The programme implementation follows the national protocol on Integrated Management of Moderate Acute Malnutrition (IMAM), using anthropometric measurements for enrolment and discharge.

Conclusion and recommendation of the re-assessment

- 5. During the preparation process of the nutrition component of the Lesotho Country Programme document, the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare had requested more time to improve institutional, operational and staffing capacities before introducing a new nutritional product recommended by WFP. As a result, WFP had initially provided Super Cereal product to children under the age of five with a view to make the necessary adjustments at a later stage.
- 6. Following readiness of the Ministry of Health to provide a more appropriate product, the CO seeks now to accommodate the initially recommended nutritional product (Super Cereal Plus) under the "Right Food at the Right Time" framework for curative and preventive activities. In line with the corporate guidance and latest evidence in nutritional effectiveness the Nutrition and Health component will include the provision of specialized products for specific subgroups:

Curative:

U5: Super cereal plusPLW: Super cerealHIV/TB: Super cereal

Preventive:

U2: Super cereal plusPLW: Super cereal

Purpose of budget revision

- 7. The first purpose of this budget revision is to include a new fortified blended food into the food basket commodity of the nutrition component in order to effectively support the Government in treating moderate acute malnutrition and prevention of chronic malnutrition. WFP will use this more specialized nutritional product (Supercereal Plus), which is easily absorbed and has a better micronutrient profile. This product is more effective in the treatment and prevention of malnutrition of children aged 6 to 59 months and 6 to 23 months respectively. Pregnant and lactating women, ART and TB clients WFP will be provided with fortified blended food (Supercereal).
- 8. All products to be used are in line with the National IMAM protocol as well as WFP's recommendations and mission on improving nutrition: "Ensuring Access to the Right Food, at the Right Place at the Right Time".
- 9. The second purpose of this budget revision is to revise the budget plan in order to accommodate a recent contribution from the Government of South Africa (RSA) to support Lesotho to address the current food crises in the country. Supplementary feeding (curative)

will be expanded to cover the entire country therefore increasing the number of beneficiaries reached.

FOOD REQUIREMENTS

- 10. Under this revision, Super cereal rations for component 3, Nutrition and HIV were reduced to align with corporative guidelines from 333g to 250g per person per day.
- 11. The total food commodities required will increase from 33,060 mt to 35,946 mt. The changes resulted from the increase in Super cereal, and introduction of Super cereal Plus.
