NATURE OF THE INCREASE

- 1. The purpose of this budget revision is to make the following changes to component 2 (school feeding) of the Country Programme:
 - increase the number of targeted school children in the North Autonomous Caribbean Region (RACN) by 7,000 girls and 7,000 boys for a total of 14,000 children;
 - include dates to raise the nutritional and energy value of the food basket and absorb in-kind contributions:
 - > increase the rice ration in the food basket; and
 - include school garden activities to support the government strategy to augment the National School Meal Programme.
- 2. The revision will result in an overall budget increase of USD 3.7 million, including USD 89,105 for capacity strengthening activities (CD&A) to support school gardens. The total food requirement for component 2 will increase by 2,381 mt, while the overall food and associated costs will increase by USD 2,722,213 including through a revision of the landside transport, storage and handling (LTSH) matrix. The budget revision also includes an additional USD 655,520 in DSC.

JUSTIFICATION FOR THE REVISION

Summary of existing project activities

- 3. The objective of CP 200434 is to support the Government of Nicaragua in the design and implementation of long-term solutions in order to break the inter-generational cycle of under-nutrition and hunger. All activities include a strong capacity development component to enable the government to design, manage, implement, monitor and evaluate its programmes.
- 4. The CP is in line with the Government's National Human Development Plan, Strategic Objectives 3 and 4 of the WFP Strategic Plan (2014-2017), and the United Nations Development Assistance Framework. It consists of the following components:
 - > Nutritional Support for Vulnerable Groups: WFP targets pregnant and lactating women, and children aged 6-23 months in support of national efforts to prevent undernutrition, micronutrient deficiencies, and health deterioration. (WFP Strategic Objective 4)
 - > Support Access to Education: In line with the National Education Plan, under the school feeding component, WFP supports pre and primary schoolchildren with school meals to contribute to increase attendance and retention rates. (WFP Strategic Objective 4)
 - ➤ Enhance Community and Household Resilience: WFP implements food assistance for assets and food assistance for training activities to improve livelihoods and strengthen the resilience of communities and households to mitigate shocks and adapt to climate change. (WFP Strategic Objective 3)



- ➤ Mitigate the Impact of HIV: Under this component, WFP supports adherence to antiretroviral therapy among HIV clients. (WFP Strategic Objective 4)
- > Support to increased productivity, quality and access to markets for smallholder farmer organizations: WFP activities aim to increase smallholder farmer productivity and quality, to connect farmers to markets and integrate local purchases into food-based national safety nets. (WFP Strategic Objective 3)
- 5. The geographical targeting of beneficiaries is based on vulnerability analysis mapping studies that identified municipalities as highly or extremely vulnerable to food insecurity. Targeting criteria also include: Municipalities with a high level of environmental degradation; high proportion of families depending on subsistence and smallholder farming for their livelihoods; high rates of chronic undernutrition; low school attendance rates and high proportion of indigenous population.

Purpose of change in budget increase

- 6. Due to higher than foreseen enrolment rates in the North Autonomous Caribbean Region (RACN), WFP assisted 6,300 more children than originally planned. In order to align to the expected rise in enrolment rates, WFP seeks to increase the planned number of targeted school children in the RACN by 14,000. The increase in enrolment rates can be attributed to the provision of school meals and changes in government policy. In line with MDG 2, the Government of Nicaragua, through its National Education Plan has actively promoted school enrolment particularly in primary schools. The government has eliminated exam fees, school maintenance and other fees, including school uniforms that presented a major financial burden on parents at the start of the school year. Further, the Ministry of Education, through its community network, has closely followed-up with families to ensure the enrolment of their school-aged children. The government has also provided school supplies, shoes and other clothing to students living in extreme poverty.
- 7. The budget revision aims to include dates in the school meals food basket and provide WFP targeted schoolchildren a ration of 10 grams per day for 150 school days per year. In the last 2 years, WFP Nicaragua has introduced dates in the school meals programme to support pre and primary school children in food-insecure municipalities in Jinotega and RACN. Dates were widely accepted by students, teachers, parents and government partners and improved the nutritional and energy value of the school meal ration. Through this BR, dates will be included in the food basket for school meals through 2018.
- 8. The Government of Nicaragua has defined four pillars in its national school feeding strategy: School meals, school gardens, regulation of food kiosks at schools, and inclusion of food and nutrition security education in the school curriculum. The Ministry of Education has requested WFP's support for the first three pillars of the strategy, while FAO provides assistance to main-stream food security and nutrition in the school curricula. Thus far, WFP Nicaragua has supported the school garden pillar of the National School Feeding Programme (NSFP) by disseminating educational material, but it has lacked funding to establish school gardens and



provide training. The main objective of school gardens is to promote food security and nutritional education among children.

- 9. Through this budget revision, WFP will enhance its support to school gardens by an initial investment in agricultural inputs including seeds to establish 136 school gardens and by providing training materials and support to the Ministry of Education in training school garden committees and government technical staff at municipal level.
- 10. To align with the National School Meal Programme, the Ministry of Education requested WFP to ensure a rice ration of 40 grams for all schoolchildren. Thus far, WFP has provided different staples in the two targeted geographic areas based on local preferences: Children in Jinotega received only maize, while children in RACN received only rice as maize is not part the dietary habits of the Caribbean population. This revision will ensure a ration of 80 grams/person/day of cereals by complementing the existing commodities as per Table 2. 40 grams of rice provided by WFP will be added to the ration in Jinotega while 40 grams of wheat flour will be provided by the government and added to the rations in RACN.
